

THE RELEVANCE OF PAIN IN CANCER CARE AND REHABILITATION

DID YOU KNOW?

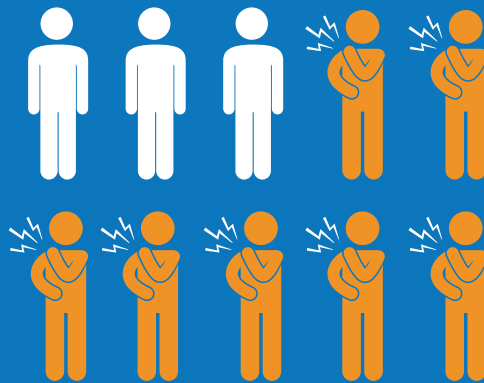
Pain affects many people with cancerⁱ and pain management is important in palliative care too.ⁱⁱ Pain management should be an integral part of cancer treatment. There is an increasing need to improve cancer-related pain care policy in Europe.

Pain is a common problem in cancer survivors, especially in the first few years after treatment.ⁱⁱⁱ In the longer term, approximately 5 to 10% of survivors have chronic severe pain that interferes with functioning.

Pain relief is of primary concern for all those with cancer.^{iv}

Pain occurs in more than 70% of patients with cancer.*^v



*Pain also occurs in around 80% of patients with advanced cancer.^{vi}
