Societal Impact of Pain (SIP) 2012

May 29-31, Copenhagen, Denmark

The SIP 2012 symposium takes place under the high patronage of the Italian Presidency of the Council of Ministers and the Italian Ministry of Health.

The symposium is hosted by the Danish Association for Chronic Pain Patients (FAKS). The scientific framework of SIP 2012 is under the responsibility of the European Federation of IASP® Chapters (EFIC®). The pharmaceutical company Grünenthal GmbH is responsible for funding and non-financial support (e.g. logistical support). The scientific aims of the SIP 2012 symposium have been endorsed by a large number of pain advocacy and scientific organisations.



The Ethical Committee for the Pharmaceutical Industry in Denmark (ENLI) has been notified of the Symposium. The SIP 2012 Symposium has been pre-approved by ENLI with the current format and content.

This letter is to invite you to block May 30 & 31, 2012 in your agenda for your participation at the symposium “Societal Impact of Pain” SIP 2012 in Copenhagen, Denmark.

Chronic pain poses a severe burden on the individual but also on the society, including an enormous economic burden for the health care systems. So far, a structured program of the institutions of the EU targeting these challenges and long-term consequences of chronic pain is missing:

- Chronic pain is one of the major reasons for discontinuation of labour and early retirement and undermines the *Europe 2020 Strategy for smart, sustainable and inclusive growth*.
- Chronic pain, which is pre-dominant mainly in elderly people, also undermines the European goal of healthy ageing, as expressed in the *European innovation partnership action and healthy ageing*.
- Chronic pain directly affects sufferers and their quality of life and should be addressed by a common, horizontal approach according to a resolution on non-communicable diseases adopted by the European Parliament recently.

It is therefore that EFIC[®], as one of the most relevant scientific societies of healthcare professionals for the study of pain in Europe, calls for policymakers and decision-makers alike to adopt a much wider, strategic perspective in their deliberations regarding service provision and resource allocation.

In May 2011 the symposium “Societal Impact of Pain” took place in the European parliament. An important outcome of SIP 2011 was the Road Map for Action, which outlines the key issues on how the EU institutions and member states could effectively address the societal impact of pain at both EU and national levels.

Based on the tremendous response of the previous SIP symposia EFIC[®] and Grünenthal have decided to organise SIP 2012. The national and European implementation of the Road Map for Action will be a central theme for discussion.

In the first half of 2012, Denmark will hold the Presidency of the Council of the European Union. Supported by a large group of Danish and European stakeholders EFIC[®] aims to raise awareness with the Presidency of the Council of the European Union for the societal impact of pain by organising SIP 2012 in Denmark.

The 3rd symposium on the “Societal Impact of Pain” will take place May 30 & 31, 2012 in Copenhagen, Denmark. This symposium offers a unique opportunity for developing the dialogue between all key stakeholders involved in future pain management policy.

The SIP 2012 symposium is hosted by the Danish Association for Chronic Pain Patients (FAKS). The scientific framework of SIP 2012 is under the responsibility of the European Federation of IASP® Chapters (EFIC®). The pharmaceutical company Grünenthal GmbH is responsible for funding and non-financial support (e.g. logistical support).

Auditorium 15 - Workshop 1: Chronic Diseases: Chronic Pain as a disease in its own right

On 11.8.2011 John Dalli, European Commissioner for Health and Consumer Policy, answered the following on questions raised by MEP Jim Higgins¹:

“Following the Council Conclusions² on "innovative approaches for chronic diseases in public health and healthcare systems" adopted on 7 December 2010, the Commission intends to support Member States in a reflection process on chronic diseases aimed at identifying options to optimize the response to the challenges of chronic diseases.

As part of this work the Commission plans to invite the views of a wide range of organizations and stakeholders with an interest in chronic diseases including in relation to pain. The Commission will also build on its on-going work on addressing the determinants which are risk factors for a large number of chronic diseases which cause pain.”
 The workshop’s objective is to investigate the position of pain in relation to chronic diseases and identify risk factors for a large number of chronic diseases which have pain as a concomitant disease.

Room 20 - Workshop 2: Active & Healthy Ageing: Pain management for an improved quality of life

In 2011 the European Council endorsed the European Commission's launch of the European Innovation Partnership on Active and Healthy Ageing. 'Active and Healthy Ageing' is the process of optimizing opportunities for health, participation and security in order to enhance quality of life as people age. It applies to both individuals and population groups. 'Health' refers to physical, mental and social wellbeing. 'Active' refers to continuing participation in social, economic, cultural, spiritual and civic affairs, not just the simple ability to be physically active or to participate in the labour force.³

The pilot European Innovation Partnership on Active and Healthy Ageing will pursue a triple win for Europe⁴:

1. enabling EU citizens to lead healthy, active and independent lives while ageing;
2. improving the sustainability and efficiency of social and health care systems;
3. boosting and improving the competitiveness of the markets for innovative products and services, responding to the ageing challenge at both EU and global level, thus creating new opportunities for businesses.

This triple win for Europe is to be realised in the three areas of prevention and health promotion, care and cure, and active and independent living of elderly people. The overarching target of this pilot partnership will be to increase the average healthy lifespan by two years by 2020.

The European Commission plans to work closely with national governments and a wide range of stakeholders to move the Strategic Implementation Plan forward.

In the operational plan published by the steering committee pain is mentioned as: *"Define outcome criteria and health care indicators and tools to document the quality of specific care (e.g. pain management and its societal impact)."*⁵

The workshop will address the issues related to these outcome criteria, health care indicators and tools to document the quality of pain management and its societal impact in relation to Active & Healthy Ageing.

Anticipated outcome: position on outcome criteria, health care indicators and tools to document the quality of pain management and its societal impact in relation to Active & Healthy Ageing.

Room 19 - Workshop 3: Improving pain management: Delivering results in best practice cooperation models

Due to the lack of internationally accepted indicators in pain management, chronic pain hardly ever shows up in global surveys. On the other hand there is good evidence that pain treatment programmes (both acute and chronic) can reduce suffering for the patient, improve medical outcome parameters and maintain people in the workforce. Proven health care outcome increasingly gains importance for fencing budgets and resources in pain management. In several EU member states very promising commissioning and cooperation models have been initiated. Health care providers, health care commissioners, consumer and patient representatives will discuss best practice and measurable deliverables in pain management and give participants an insight in the direction of future pain management.

Anticipated outcome: key learning's and proposals to package pain management in cooperation models with clearly defined outcomes

Bella Vista 1 – Workshop 5: Establishing multi-stakeholder pain platforms in Europe

In 2001, the European Federation of the International Association for the Study of Pain Chapters (EFIC®) published its Declaration on Pain which called on national governments and the EU Institutions to increase the level of awareness of the societal impact of pain. Ten years on from the EFIC® Declaration on Pain, national and EU policy action has been very limited. At the same time, basic and clinical science have demonstrated the feasibility of pathways out of pain for many types of acute and chronic pain, but health care systems currently do not guarantee general access to these.

In May 2011 the symposium “Societal Impact of Pain” took place in the European parliament. An important outcome of SIP 2011 was the SIP - Road Map for Action, which outlines the key issues on how the EU institutions and member states could effectively address the societal impact of pain at both EU and national levels. Since then in several European countries representatives of key stakeholder groups have come together to discuss the national implementation of the objectives of the “SIP – A ROAD MAP FOR ACTION”. The objective of this workshop is to discuss and share local and national best practices.

Anticipated outcome: a practical guide to national implementation of the SIP Road Map
